✠ *Weekly Reflection*

"You say I am a king." So Jesus responds to Pilate, when Pilate presses him on his kingship.

"Are you then a king?" asks Pilate.


"You say I am a king." So Jesus admonishes Pilate, with this half-affirmation at best, because he knows what kind of king Pilate has in mind: the beastly kind, the prophet Daniel's tyrant of ten horns, who rules by the lie that *might makes right*. The kind of king whose reign begins and ends steeped in others' blood. As Jesus stands before Pilate, he stands ready to shed his *own* blood for a different kind of reign. He's not Pilate's kind of king at all.

The church's choice of this gospel passage for the Solemnity of Christ the King invites us to solemn reflection. We would do well to heed Jesus's admonishment ourselves, for too many times in Christian history we've made Pilate's mistake. When Christians marched under the banners of the Crusades, they marched under a false flag; when the Inquisition bled its opponents with the blade, it sought truth with lies; and today, in this age of anxiety, do we not face the temptation to hitch ourselves to a leader, *any* leader, who has the seeming strength to save us? Or to any power, or any technology, or any means whatsoever, no matter the ultimate cost—so long as it seemingly helps us through the terrible *now*?

The Solemnity of Christ the King confronts us with that temptation toward worldly strength and power and glory. For that very reason, we can and must celebrate it, to nourish our hope and resistance. For there is different kind of strength to save here. It's the kind of strength the poor know in their extremity, and that Saint Oscar Romero discovered when he fell in love with them and the gospel. There's a scene in the movie *Romero* that captures the moment of his discovery. "You are a liar," Raúl Juliá's Romero says to the dictator's face. And so he realizes the truth: the power that oppresses depends on lies. It is *not* absolute. Try as it might, it cannot make right. And so it cannot last. It falls in self-contradiction.

Whereas Jesus stands before Pilate, strong in the everlasting truth of the reign of God, the truth for which he came into the world. By his own blood he testifies, that God's dominion extends over life and death itself and knows no contradiction. And so Jesus goes willingly to his death, trusting that *God saves*.

I am the Alpha and the Omega, God proclaims in the Book of Revelations. *God has made the world firm, not to be moved*, we ourselves proclaim with the psalmist. Dare we believe it? Dare we believe what we truly celebrate today, and so draw the strength to walk in Jesus's footsteps, and stand with all those who speak truth to power?



Today as a Church, we conclude our liturgical year and celebrate the Feast of Christ the King. The Gospel we proclaim shows the great mystery of our faith: In the moment of his crucifixion, Jesus is shown to be King and Savior of all. Luke's Gospel has been loaded with surprises: the poor are rich, sinners find salvation, the Kingdom of God is found in our midst. Here we see the greatest surprise of all. We are confronted with the crucified Jesus, whom faith tells us is King and Savior of all. The irony is that the inscription placed on the cross, perhaps in mockery, contains the profoundest of truth. As the leaders jeer, the thief crucified by his side recognizes Jesus as Messiah and King, and finds salvation.

Jesus is King, but not the kind of king we might have imagined or expected. His kingship was hidden from many of his contemporaries, but those who had the eyes of faith were able to see. As modern disciples of Jesus, we, too, struggle at times to recognize Jesus as King. Today's Gospel invites us to make our own judgment. With eyes of faith, we, too, recognize that Jesus, the crucified One, is indeed King and Savior of all.

The Byzantine Liturgy proclaims, "Today is the prelude :to God's munificence, and the announcement of salvation in the Temple of God the Virgin is seen openly, foretelling to all the coming of Christ.... The most pure temple of ,the Savior, his most precious bridal chamber, the Virgin sacred treasury of God's glory, enters today into the house of the Lord, bringing with her the grace of the divine Spirit. Wherefore the angels of God are singing: 'Behold the heavenly tabernacle!'... Wherefore let us cry out to her with all our strength: 'Joy to you, fulfillment of the Creator's plan!'" "Let us ask Mary, presented in the temple, to take our poor offering into her maternal hands, to purify and complete it by her offering, so pure, so perfect; to include and hide it in hers, so great and so generous"

Saint Cecilia November 22



In the city of Rome there was a virgin named Cecilia, who came from an extremely rich family and was given in marriage to a youth named Valerian. She wore sackcloth next to her skin, fasted, and invoked the saints, angels, and virgins, beseeching them to guard her virginity

During her wedding ceremony she was said to have sung in her heart to God and before the consummation of her nuptials, she told her husband she had taken a vow of virginity and had an angel protecting her. Following his baptism, Valerian returned to his wife and found an angel at her side. The angel then crowned Cecilia with a chaplet of rose and lily St. Cecilia spent her time preaching and in her lifetime was able to convert over four hundred people, most of whom were baptized by Pope Urban. Cecilia was later arrested and condemned to be suffocated in the baths. She was shut in for one night and one day, as fires were heaped up and stoked to a terrifying heat - but Cecilia did not even sweat.

When Almachius heard this, he sent an executioner to cut off her head in the baths.

The executioner struck her three times but was unable to decapitate her so he left her bleeding and she lived for three days. St. Cecilia is regarded as the patroness of music, because she heard heavenly music in

Saint Andrew Dũng-Lac and Companions November 24

In Vietnam between 1820 and 1862 117 persons were martyred. Among these were ninety-six Vietnamese, eleven missionaries born in [Spain](#), and ten French missionaries.. These martyrs gave their lives not only for the Church but for their country as well. They showed that they wanted the gospel of [Christ](#) to take root in their people and contribute to the [good](#) of their homeland. By 1954 there were over a million and a half Catholics—about seven percent of the population—in the north. Buddhists represented about 60 percent. Persistent persecution forced some 670,000 Catholics to abandon lands, homes and possessions and flee to the south. In 1964, there were still 833,000 Catholics in the north, but many were in prison. In the south, Catholics were enjoying the first decade of religious freedom in centuries, their numbers swelled by refugees.



The Catholic faith took root among the Vietnamese people through the fervent witness of French Jesuit Alexandre de Rhodes in the early 17th century. By 1800, Catholics in Vietnam numbered more than 300,000. This burgeoning Church suffered repeated persecutions. The greatest—brutalities came under the emperors Minh Mang (1820) and Tu Duc (1847–1883). Villages of Christians were destroyed and their possessions confiscated. Families were broken apart. Christians were branded on the forehead with ta dao, "false religion." It is believed that between 130,000 .and 300,000 Christians died in the various persecutions The 117 remembered today represent the many unknown martyrs.




Age 72 or older?

You may be eligible to reduce the taxes on your RMD

Instruct your IRA custodian to turn your Required Minimum Distribution into a Qualified Charitable Distribution to St. Clare of Assisi before year end.

Everyone over the age of 72 must take a Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) from their IRA and 401k retirement accounts or face stiff penalties from the government by December 31, 2022

Almost everyone also receives Social Security as well. The hidden fact is that all your RMD is considered "ordinary income" and therefore impacts the tax rate that is applied to your Social Security benefits ... the higher your RMD, the higher your **Social Security benefit becomes taxable income** (up to 85% taxable at whatever your tax rate would be). **Even donating money you directly receive from your RMD that you then send to a charity still counts as "ordinary income."**

Since most seniors don't have regular salaries, even taking charitable deductions (where you write the check to the charity yourself) will significantly impact your tax rate. **Having your RMD check sent directly to the charity eliminates these amounts as income, lowering your total "ordinary income" level and reducing the rate the government can assess your Social Security benefit.**

Simply direct your financial advisor or IRA/401k administrator to issue the amount you want to withdraw **directly** to St. Clare of Assisi. We need YOUR help to make this happen!




Thanksgiving Prayer




