Registration is the official way to join our community! Many people think because they attend the parish, they are automatically members. Without formal enrollment, we can't accurately gauge our membership or take a census. Census numbers determine how many priests are assigned to a parish, how many Masses or Confession opportunities we provide, and the number or frequency of faith formation opportunities. Registration shows us you belong! It is also necessary for certain benefits, like scheduling sacraments, getting God parent and sponsor certificates, getting approved for reduced tuition through Catholic schools, and getting copies of your donations for tax reporting. Registering in our parish is a statement of faith, of confidence in our mission, and your response to the call for the New Evangelization! An elemental biblical truth is that in a world gone wrong, there is no communion without sacrifice. Since the world has been twisted out of shape, it can be straightened only through a painful process of reconfiguration. It is practically impossible to read any two pages of the Bible in succession without coming across the language of God's anger, but we mustn't interpret this symbolic expression literally, as though God passes in and out of emotional snits/ The divine wrath is a theological symbol for the justice of God-which is to say, God's passion to set things right. In his love, God cannot allow his fallen world to remain in alienation; rather, he must do the hard work of drawing it back into communion. And this means that God is continually about the business of sacrifice. In the years following Vatican II, the meal dimension of the Eucharist was almost exclusively emphasized, both by theologians and by pastoral practitioners. The active participation of the community, gathered at the banquet of the Lord, was given pride of place. The classical description of the Mass as a sacrifice was muted, and the locale where the priest celebrated the sacrament was referred to for the most part as a "table" and not as an "altar." This shift of focus was undoubtedly an attempt to correct an excessive stress on the sacrificial dimension of the Eucharist prior to the council, but the pendular swing did not help the Church. When the two aspects of the Eucharist-meal and sacrifice-are separated, the biblical principle that I articulated above is compromised, and the Mass can devolve into something less than fully serious. There can be no communion without sacrifice, and thus there is no Eucharistic table that is not, at the same time, an altar. In this second section, I would like to explore the sacrificial dimension of the Eucharist, and as I did in the previous section, I would like to conduct my analysis within a wide biblical framework. In the last chapter, we saw how the author of Genesis articulated the fundamental problem as self-deification, the all-too -human tendency to cling to godliness rather than to surrender to God. This spiritual disorder conduced to a rapid disintegration of the coinherence that God wanted to hold sway in his creation. In the wake of the original rupture with God, man was pitted against woman and woman against man-both were pitted against nature, love having been replaced by suspicion and violence. The Bible recounts this moral and spiritual declension with its typical narrative laconicism. Cain and Abel, the sons of Adam and Eve, fell out of friendship and Cain ruthlessly slew his brother, becoming, in a telling detail, the founder of cities. (Is there, in the literature of the world, any more devastating critique of the way human beings tend to organize themselves?) By the time of Noah, "the wickedness of humankind was great in the earth, and ... every inclination of the thoughts of their hearts was only evil continually" (Gen. 6:5), and God accordingly sent a great flood to wipe out life on earth. Often in the biblical stories, flood waters are evocative of the primal, watery chaos that held sway before God brought forth the order of creation. Hence they are expressive, not of God's arbitrary punishment, but of the destructive power of sin.



# The Holy Innocents in Our Community:

Did you know that the remains of six unidentified infants were turned over to the Maricopa County Coroner between 2017 and 2022? Had these children been surrendered under the Baby Safe Haven Law, at a designated Church, Fire Station, or Hospital, some of them would still be alive. Some are even pre-born babies, their lives tragically ended too soon, perhaps by means of abortion.

#### Case No. 17-02851

Skeletal remains of a little girl, aged 9-10 months, were found at a construction site in Phoenix. She was found with red towels, a Curious George stuffie, and a Songebob Squarepants blanket. This little girl was turned over to the Maricopa County Coroner on April 18, 2017.

#### Case No. 21-05504

An unidentified infant, estimated to be 36-40 gestational weeks (9 months of pregnancy), was found inside a backpack behind a local business. This little girl was turned over to the Maricopa County Coroner on May 28, 2021.

Lord God, ever caring and gentle, we commit to your love these little ones, Case Numbers 17-02851 and 21-05504, quickened to life for so short a time. Enfold them in eternal life. We pray for all who are saddened by the loss of a child. We pray for those who have turned to abortion, that they may be healed by your merciful love. We pray, too, for those who advocate for abortion, that they may be moved to supporting a culture of life. Give pregnant mothers and parents courage, help them on their journey of embracing life and love. May we all meet one day in the joy and peace of your kingdom. We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen.



# The 33rd Sunday in Ordinary Time, November 16-17: Worship Aid

Welcome to St. Clare of Assisi Parish! We are glad you are here for the celebration of the Holy Mass. Please take note of the guidelines for the reception of Holy Communion: Prior to receiving Communion, Catholics should have fasted for one hour; water and medicine excepting. Catholics aware of grave sin (e.g. intentionally missing Mass on Sunday/Holy Days, abortion, theft, sexual sin, use of contraceptives, etc.) should go to Confession prior to receiving Communion. Because of our belief in the Eucharist being the Body and Blood of Christ, reception of Communion is reserved to Catholics. There may exist circumstances in the lives of some individual Catholics, which may not facilitate immediate participation in receiving Communion (e.g., cohabitation, marriage outside the Church).
